Student leadership gives children the opportunity to practice vital social and emotional skills, pursue academic and personal goals with confidence, and build positive friendships and relationships. Sanford Harmony Academy's curriculum is built around four focus themes containing strategies to build positive peer relationships—Be Your Best Self, Value Each Other, Learn from Others, and Communicate with Each Other—which align with CASEL core competencies, that will help students become the best leaders and people they can be.



FOCUS THEME 1

Help Students Be Their Best Selves

Helping children be their best selves means providing opportunities for them to learn strategies to:

- · Recognize their emotions;
- · Understand how emotions influence thoughts and actions;
- · Identify situations that they can or cannot control; and
- Take on a growth mindset that enables them to use mistakes and challenges as catalysts for growth.

- 1. What are some barriers to supporting students as they learn strategies to be their best selves?
- 2. How can we, as educators, put processes and systems into place that help them overcome these barriers?

FOCUS THEME 2

Show Students the Importance of Valuing Each Other

By appreciating the contributions and perspectives of others, students develop empathy, build relationship skills, and stand up for themselves and others when they see unfair behaviors.

Reflection Question

Valuing others means appreciating differences, including everyone, breaking stereotypes, and being empathetic and supportive. At our school, how can we give students opportunities to value one another?

Encourage Students to Learn From Each Other	
Conflict is a necessary part of life, and it's important to understand why conflicts occur to resolve them.	
Key Consideration: There are three approaches to resolving conflict: conflict avoider (like a turtle), conflict controller (like a shark), and solution finder (like an owl).

Learning to resolve conflict in an intentional way deepens students' understanding of their own perspectives and the perspectives of others.	
The STEP It Up! conflict resolution process helps children learn healthy ways to communicate through conflict with their peers. Students can:	
Stop, think, and cool off;	
• Talk it out;	
• Evaluate possible solutions; and	
• P ick a realistic solution and try it.	
FOCUS THEME 4	
Build Intentional Opportunities for Peer Communication	
Practicing effective communication is a cornerstone of student leadership and growth. Students can learn a range of social skills that support effective communication and help to avoid	
communication mishaps.	
Key Consideration: "Communication Boosters," like listening, supporting, and negotiating, help children get along with and understand each other. Avoiding "Communication Bloopers," like interrupting, ignoring, and withdrawing, improves communication.	
Reflection Question	
Teaching students to communicate as they work together helps everyone think of new ideas, do things they might not do alone, and listen to others' ideas. What opportunities do we have in our school to encourage collaboration among students?
